

# Parental Involvement Plan

### General Expectations

Goshen Lane Elementary School agrees to:

#### **School will:**

1. Provide high-quality curriculum and instruction in a supportive and effective learning environment that enables the participating children to meet Ohio's New Learning Standards as follows:
  - Our School will provide a curriculum with formative assessment that is based on scientific research. Literacy instruction will include: Guided Reading, Reading and Writing Workshop, Leveled Literacy Intervention and Reading Recovery. Math instruction will utilize the Investigations Mathematics program developed by

Pearson. Teachers and Parents will work together as partners in delivering and reinforcing instruction. Parent communication folders will be utilized. Daily reading is expected and other practice activities will be utilized.

2. Hold parent-teacher conferences during which information from the compact will be discussed as it relates to the individual child's academic achievement. Conferences will be held: As needed and can be arranged by appointment before, after or during school time. Designated conference days will be held on: October 10<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> and February 6<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup>. Teachers will also utilize telephone calls and email to communicate with parents about the progress of students.
3. Provide parents with frequent reports on their children's progress. Specifically, the school will provide reports as follows:
  - Report cards will be available via the Infinite Campus Parent Portal in: November, February and June (elementary) and October, January, March, and June (middle school).
  - Final report cards will be mailed at the conclusion of the school year unless students have report card holds due to unpaid fees.
4. Provide parents reasonable access to staff. Specifically, staff will be available for consultation with parents as follows:
  - Staff is available for consultation as needed and can be arranged by appointment before, after or during school time. Teachers will also be available by telephone and email and will visit families at home as needed.
5. Provide parents opportunities to volunteer in their children's school, participate in their children's class and observe classroom activities, as follows:
  - Utilize parent volunteers for assisting in classroom activities, assessment and instruction through collaboration with the classroom teachers.
  - PTA coordinates volunteer opportunities for the PTA and these include the Meet the Teacher Night, Book Fairs, Donuts with Dudes, Cookie Tray Project, Donuts with Divas, and other activities.

**Parents** will support our children's learning in the following ways:

- Making sure students are at school and on time or early every day possible.
  - Making sure that homework is completed and shared
  - Monitoring and limiting screen time.
  - Providing educational opportunities with activities and travel.
  - Participating, as appropriate, in decisions relating to my children's education
  - Sign up for the school and district correspondence.
  - Promoting positive use of children's extracurricular time
  - Staying informed about children's education and communicating with the school by promptly reading all notices from the school or the school district, either received by children, email or by mail, and responding as appropriate
  - Serving, to the extent possible, on policy advisory groups, such as: PTO, School Safety Committee, etc.
